Job will include: answering the phone and dealing with the Public, keeping Website updated, filing and other duties assigned as needed. Must have good reading and writing skills.



Meet your candidates:

Also, as a founding member and current Home Board member of Piedmont's American Legion, I am a life member of Disabled American Vets and the VFW. In addition to my activities for the City of Piedmont, I am the South Dakota State Director and an Executive Director of the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies. I have been self-employed since the 1980's.

I know we need to work with our neighboring cities, but I am concerned by how some people want us to be like them. I say, "Not on my watch!" We can't stop progress, but we must keep our values and freedom.

Phil's Corner

It is often said that in South Dakota we have two seasons, winter and construction. This year in Piedmont, construction season started quite a bit earlier than normal. This was in response to one of the priority programs of the Board of Trustees. After Piedmont was incorporated, the Board identified four areas of infrastructure improvement we wished to address while keeping the property tax as low as possible and limiting local government interference in the lives of our residents. These four areas were: a central water system, a municipal sewer system, street improvements and flood mitigation. In the past nine years the population of our community has quadrupled, however our goals remain the same. Most of the growth we have experienced is from voluntary annexation of areas of the Piedmont Valley that shared the goals and values of the residents of the original town. Most of the residents of Piedmont now have access to a safe central water system. This has had the added benefit of a better ISO rating for fire protection resulting in lower homeowner insurance rates. We have been able to accomplish this while keeping water rates equal to or lower than rates in other cities in the Black Hills. The city has established a tax increment financing (TIF) district for the reasons legislation was originally passed by state government: To enhance "commercial" growth and rehabilitate blighted areas. The idea is to get more local business in our town and also help some of the owners of older homes that are on septic systems. We are enthusiastic that this will improve quality of life in our community. Now, the reason the construction season started so early in Piedmont. For the entire nine years of our existence as an incorporated town, community leadership has resisted the urge to increase the bureaucracy. We do not buy in to the idea that we need to increase wages to get qualified elected officials and employees in our city government. Our elected officials and our employees donate countless hours toward making government work. The volunteer spirit is what makes our town work. It is also the reason we were able to save one half million dollars over the last nine years from our lowest tax levy in the area. This thriftiness, coupled with a grant from the South Dakota Department of Transportation for the improvement of main streets in small towns, made it feasible to bid a project that improves Main and Second Street in our town and mitigates a great many of our flooding concerns. We had hoped to finish this project by the middle of October, but because of the great weather we hope to have these improvements completed by our Fourth of July celebration. This year we once again scheduled our municipal election to run concurrent with the South Dakota primary election on June 7th. We requested that this election be held in conjunction with the Meade County election to save costs. The Meade County Commission denied our request. The city election will be held at city hall and the county election at the school gymnasium. We have two trustee positions up for election and are proposing a bond election in conjunction with the TIF district. Please don't forget to vote in both. Good local government can only be had with citizen involvement.

Board of Trustees Doing's, Vol. VII

Spring is here at last! We got off to a fast start on the Main Street construction, didn't we? One of the things we really worked hard to avoid doing on this street project was to avoid having to borrow money to do it. It was tough but we managed to do this job without borrowing a dine. We are proud of that and I hope our taxpayers appreciate it. If our luck with the weather holds we should have the Main Street project finished by the end of May, good Lord willing. It is only a start on getting our streets up to snuff but we think you'll like the finished product.

We spent some more time working on our ordinances over the winter. We passed a new comprehensive hunting/shooting ordinance as well as a new zoning ordinance. The hunting ordinance prohibits any hunting within city limitss except on property zoned as agriculture BY THE CITY, not the county. This does not prohibit discharge of firearms on your private property but be advised that if you discharge a weapon onto or that carries over onto your neighbor's property you are in violation of this ordinance. Archers cannot use anything but target heads (NO BROADHEADS) on private property unless hunting on zoned agriculture property. They also must use care in discharging arrows onto neighbors property.

The new zoning ordinance and the new hunting ordinance are on line on the city's website, at www.cityofpiedmontsd.com. Please take the time to become familiar as these new ordinances have changed things more than I can go into in detail here. Feel free to contact us if you have questions.

Just a reminder as we head into the summer and the recreational season, we do have a 5 day parking limit on RV's & trailers on our city streets so please keep that in mind. Thank you and be safe.

Open Burn Permits

The City of Piedmont allows Open Burning within the Municipality provided a permit is obtained. To obtain a permit contact the South Dakota Division of Wildland Fire Suppression for a Class A permit (wood materials only).

Permits can be obtained by going to:

Safety

I would like to thank our emergency services for their good work. They could use more volunteers and the lack is starting to be a concern.

City just put in boundary lines. This is really important so that we are secure from encroachment and everybody knows where the lines are.

Some things I would like to see happen:

<u>Flood Mitigation</u> – I am working on this in the hope of a grant from the state. Water from the foothills can't be stopped but we can direct the flow safely through our community.

<u>Sewer</u> – The city is working on this, but it will take some time for all the plans, engineering and money to come together.

<u>Survey the right of ways</u> – This spring I want to survey the right of ways for dead, damaged or diseased trees to prevent accidents.

<u>Urban Forestry</u> – We also need to look at the forest since I have noticed some dead trees. If they need to be removed or thinned, I will check into funding to assist in this project.

Public Safety Report

Emergency Services

We are lucky to have an excellent Fire Department & Ambulance Service. Meade County Sheriff Department continues their good work.

Emergency Management

We are working on a three-stage Flood Plan:


Main Street, which is being built now, is Stage One to get the water through. Stage Two will be south of Main. Stage Three will be north of Main. We are working with the local Council of Government to get funding for mitigation grants from FEMA and the State of South Dakota. We can't stop the water, so let's get it through our city safely.

If you have flood concerns, contact me so we can work on it.

West Nile Virus Control. I recently met with the Public Safety Officer from Summerset to establish a plan to prevent West Nile virus by spraying for mosquitoes. It will be best to combine our efforts for obtaining funding and spraying both cities at the same time.

Liaison for Park Board

They are currently working on installing the new bathroom in the park, and also working with a State Forester to replant trees and vegetation. Some of the removed trees have been put in my wood lot for distribution by the Park Board. If interested in the wood, a Park Board Member. **SONY HEMSHER**



Planning & Zoning Board

Piedmont's Planning and Zoning Board consists of five members appointed by the Piedmont Trustees to three year terms. Four members are citizen volunteers with the fifth member being a trustee serving as liaison to the Board of Trustees. Current members are: Amy Bannister, Michael Lee, Scott Toothman, and Bill Vallette along with the Trustee Bill Paris. The primary responsibility of the board is to advise the Board of Trustees on all applications brought to the city concerning platting, building, construction and zoned usage. Additionally, the board is responsible for establishing rules for administration of planning, zoning and building ordinances. The Planning and Zoning Board meets at city hall on the third Tuesday of each month at 6:30PM and the public is encouraged to attend.

In order to keep pace with the expansion of city boundaries and changing resident expectations, the board worked with the Black Hills Council of Governments and the Board of Trustees to revise the city's zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan. The year and a half long project was completed and became effective on April 8 2016. Two new zoning district categories were added for future use, but no previously zoned properties were reclassified. Neighborhood Commercial and Highway Commercial are the new future use categories. All property within the city limits of Piedmont are currently zoned and a copy of the revised ordinance can be found on the Piedmont web site under ordinances/section 17.

Frequently the board is ask to clarify when a building permit is required. The need for a permit is unchanged from the previous ordinance: "All new development, changes to existing development, and changes to the type or number of uses requires a building permit, unless the development is exempt per the Building Code & Construction Enforcement Ordinance, City of Piedmont # 2014-1." The Building Code & Construction Enforcement Ordinance also states: "no building or structure shall be erected, constructed, enlarged, altered, moved or converted unless a separate permit is obtained." Ordinance 2014-1 paragraph 7 lists permit exemptions for minor projects. Anyone who has a question on the need for a building permit should contact the city office.
